It has been reported that approximately 219 children and 194 adults attended the event with more than 50 volunteers this year. The event was free with food. music, drink, games, and crafts with the main event of "Lighting Up the Town." Keystone SMILES Preschool children dressed up as reindeer and rode on a float with Santa and Mrs. Claus in the first ever parade. We hope to generate more participation next year. The Grinch was spotted causing mischief in the town and the Boro Police put him in jail. Money was raised for the Grinch's release. Funds donated will be used for Light Up Night 2025.
